hymns that had been memorized and passed down for generations.

Some Hindu beliefs:

reincarnation - Hindus believe that each person has an eternal soul, which is reincarnated or reborn, in a new body after death.

karma - Karma is the sum of all the good and bad actions performed by the person during past lives.

dharma - Dharma is the set of specific religious and social duties assigned to each person according to his or her place in society.

moksha - A person who fulfills his/her dharma may eventually achieve moksha or liberation. In this state of perfect knowledge and happiness, individuals escape the cycle of death and rebirth and merge with Brahman, the One God.
